#### **BUILDING UPDATES**

In the last month Lucia Vorpasso, Vineta Mitrevski and I had a wonderful surprise. In the original planning for the upgrade of several of our buildings, Monmia was considered to be over entitled in the number of learning spaces/buildings we have considering the enrolment numbers we have. The Victorian School Building Authority provided us with a choice of having to lose buildings to be in keeping with what we were actually permitted to have. It was not a happy choice on our part and we unwillingly agreed that the 5/6 CLS building would be the one to be demolished.

As a Principal Class we became strong advocates for our students, our staff and our families. We raised our concerns and unhappiness with the Minister for Education, Natalie Hutchins; the Regional Director, Chris

Thompson; with Natalie Suleyman, the Minister for Youth and the VSBA managers. It was made clear to these leaders that the focus on student learning and wellbeing is directly linked to the learning Monmia students are presented with in their incredible physical environments. I am happy to share with you all that we managed to turn around the decision for demolition and the Year 5/6 CLS will remain where it is. Having spacious learning spaces is an advantage for our school community and is also a drawcard for new enrolments. This 12 year old BER will now belong to Monmia and not the Department. This means that as a School Council we are responsible for insurance, cleaning and maintenance for this building. I hope that you can all join with us in celebrating this great win for our wonderful school community.

#### THE SCHOOL-WIDE FOCUS IS: ACTIVE BYSTANDERS CAN HELP STOP BULLYING

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Dear Parents and Guardians.

#### Bullying is everyone's problem.

We all have to work together to make sure that nobody gets bullied. Bullying is an expression of power and thrives on an audience. Bullies frequently assert their superiority before an audience called bystanders. Bystanders can be part of the problem because they reinforce the bully's behavior by their laughter or their silent acknowledgment of the bully's power.

#### Bystanders can help stop Bullying. Here are important points to remember

- If you don't do anything to help someone who is being bullied and bully someone too, then you have made a bad decision.
- You can't blame other people for your bad choices.
- Even if you take part in the smallest way by laughing you will be part of the problem. It is not OK to say "someone else started it" or "someone else made me do it" or "everyone else was doing it too".
- If you are a bystander and choose not to do anything to stop it, then you are guilty of hurting that person as well.
- Bystanders should show disgust and find the courage to tell the person that what they are doing is wrong and mean and that they should stop it.

#### Let the teacher know if someone is being bullied.

If you know that another child is being bullied, then the responsible thing to do is to ask a teacher for help. This is not dobbing, but it is being very helpful. By telling a teacher, you are trying to help someone who is in trouble. It takes courage and kindness to do this for someone. Teachers need to know about bullying so that they can help the person being bullied and counsel the person doing the bullying so the behaviour stops. **Even if only one person reports bullying, this can make a big difference in making sure everyone feels safe and happy.** 

#### Family Activity

Please discuss the important role of the bystander with your child and discus what he or she will do if they see or hear bullying happening.

THE SCHOOL-WIDE FOCUS IS: CYBERBULLYING

Dear Parents and Guardians,

#### What is cyber bullying?

Cyber bullying includes teasing, spreading online rumours or sending unwanted or threatening messages or defamatory material using a range of technologies. Children using the internet can be cyber bullied or harassed through internet services like email, chat rooms, instant messaging, social networks or through websites. Bullying through mobile phone technologies such as text messaging is also considered cyber bullying.

Whilst cyber bullying can have a damaging effect on children and young people, parents can encourage them to take control of the situation.

This may be done by:

- Advising children not to reply to any messages. Often when a response is not received, the bullying stops.
- Learning how to block a person so they can't make contact.
- Keeping a record of the messages and showing parents, guardians immediately.
- Keeping usernames and passwords private.
- Understanding that cyber bullying, if threatening, is illegal and can be reported to the police.
- Contacting the website administrator or webmaster to ask for content to be removed.

#### Parents can help protect their children by:

- checking the privacy settings for your internet services
- visiting the Cyber smart websites for information <u>www.cybersmart.gov.au</u> and <u>www.bullyingnoway.com.au/</u>
- talking to the child's school if cyber bullying is happening at school
- reporting threatening messages to the police
- contacting the Cyber safety Contact Centre on 1800 880 176 for advice.


Our school will appear in 'Nearby Locations' if you're within 10kms of the school, or search for our school by name.
